The BCA crew, made up of volunteers, included folks from all over Alabama and from afar representing a variety of backgrounds including academic professionals, birding enthusiasts, and undergraduates and graduates from universities. We operated the banding at the Stables area. The weather was mild and sunny with a few windy days (we did not have any rain). We banded for a short period the first day after we set up on September 29th for the VIP sponsors event and banded through October 7th. In total, we banded 654 individuals of 47 species. We had an estimated 800 people visit the station this year. We are grateful for our wonderful visitors and supporters who helped make this year a success. While our total number was up from last year (we banded 436 in 2021), our species count was 10 lower compared to the 2021 season (Rhodes and Shepard 2021). Our most productive day was on 9/30/22 when we banded 125 birds total. Our top five species by highest banded count were (from highest to lowest): Gray Catbird, Wood Thrush, Swainson's Thrush, American Redstart, and Magnolia Warbler. Our most notable bird banded was the third Alabama record for Yellow-green Vireo banded on 9/30/22. Of note, we banded the second record of this species the fall prior at our Orange Beach swamp site. Other notable species included two Wilson's Warblers, one Eastern Whip-poor-will, and one Chuckwill's-widow.

List of birds recaptured during this effort. We captured three resident birds that we had banded the previous year at the site.

- 1. Recaptured on 10/1/22. Brown Thrasher we banded on 10/2/21 and aged an After-Hatching-Year. This bird is now at least 3 years of age.
- 2. Recaptured on 10/5/22. Carolina Chickadee we banded on 10/1/2021 and aged an After-Hatching-Year. This bird is now at least 3 years of age.
- 3. Recaptured on 10/3/22. Northern Mockingbird we banded on 10/5/21 and aged an After-Hatching-Year. This bird is now at least 2 years of age.
